Remembering the Struggle for Woman Suffrage

Ninety years ago, in August 1920, the 19th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution, giving all American women the right to vote, became the law of the land. Today, many younger women have lost sight of the momentous effect of this event and the heroic struggle that was waged over many years to assure this essential right.

The New Haven Museum, in cooperation with the New Haven League of Women Voters, presents an exhibit and programs in September and October that will recall the struggle and give it new meaning for New Haven women today.
